Hello Everyone,

Has a year ever past so quickly? I feel as if I missed several months and now it is Christmas!

There are several items we each need to be aware of:

- ANCCR membership is now \$25.00 plus a late fee of \$25.00.
- CE summary forms are due February 28. Remember these can be completed on the Internet. The web address is http://www.ncra-usa.org/certification/maintenance.html. Be sure you print a copy for your records, in case of an audit.
- The calendar year January 1 December 31st is the membership year for NCRA. The membership fee for a CTR is \$85.00. This includes the charge for the CE program. If you are not a member, there is a fee accessed for administrative cost when submitting the hours. CTRs must keep up their CE hours. If the CE hours are not maintained and reported, NCRA has procedures to revoke the CTR certification. There is far too much work involved in passing the CTR exam to ever let it expire. If your hospital is not paying for your NCRA membership, and you feel that the support of ANCCR might assist in getting that approved, please let me know. 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HOSPITAL PROFILE

High Point Regional Hospital 601 N. Elm Street High Point, NC 27262

In the beginning there were ordinary people who set about to do an extraordinary thing: Administer healthcare to their own; there were just a handful of doctors with vision, nurses with compassion, citizens with virtue. As each generation passed, the torch was passed to others who raised the bar higher. Nothing would stand in their way; not wars; nor depression. A century later, the same must be said for High Point today. Our future rests on the uncompromising strength of our past.

High Point Regional is proud to celebrate A Century of Care. High Point Regional Hospital began in 1904 and this year we celebrated a Century of Care. Over the years there have been moves from a big private residence (which served as the first hospital) to new Centers of Excellence. In 2001, construction began on the new cancer center. Remember how it rained during the winter that year? We had a huge swimming pool! The construction was delayed considerably but we were finally able to move into the center June 2003. The Cancer Registry moved into the new Cancer Registry Suite located in the Cancer Center. This was wonderful, since we had been moved several times during the construction, including the back hall of the Cashier's office!

The center has been designed with cancer patients and their families in mind—not only providing the latest in technologies, but also ensuring an environment that promotes healing and wholeness. The center's 18 inpatient beds are oversized rooms that include kitchens (microwave, refrigerator and table for dining.) The room is furnished so the patients' families can spend the night. Patients undergoing treatment can also move about the facility and visit the garden, the labyrinth, or their balcony to enjoy fresh air. The family room has seating areas, toys for kids, a full size kitchen and large dining area. Also, to aid with information gathering, a library is available to assist visitors with Internet access and other resources so they can get information to research any disease. Radiation Oncology is located on the first floor. Emerywood Oncology and the Resource center is located on the second floor with the registry.

Deborah Carrethers, who works full time at Forsyth, also works 32 hours a week for High Point. We have arranged for Deborah to have an Internet connection so she can do some work at home. She has been part time since 1998.

I have been the Cancer Program Coordinator since May 1995. In 1996, HPRHS was ACoS accredited as a Comprehensive Community Cancer Program. We abstract around 1000 cases a year.

In the fall of 2004, High Point Regional was recognized as the only hospital in North Carolina who provides all aspects of cancer care under one roof.




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
